Jacobs' catch was one of the heaviest of this species to be taken by rod and reel in a number of years. The unusually heavy run of weakies kept other anglers busy. William Ehrlich hauled in no less than 96, Gus Blaufauss reeled in 62, Herman Fiedler 45, and Arthur Hanff 36. All were fishing from the Anglers' Pier—except Jacobs, who had a total of 57 for the day.

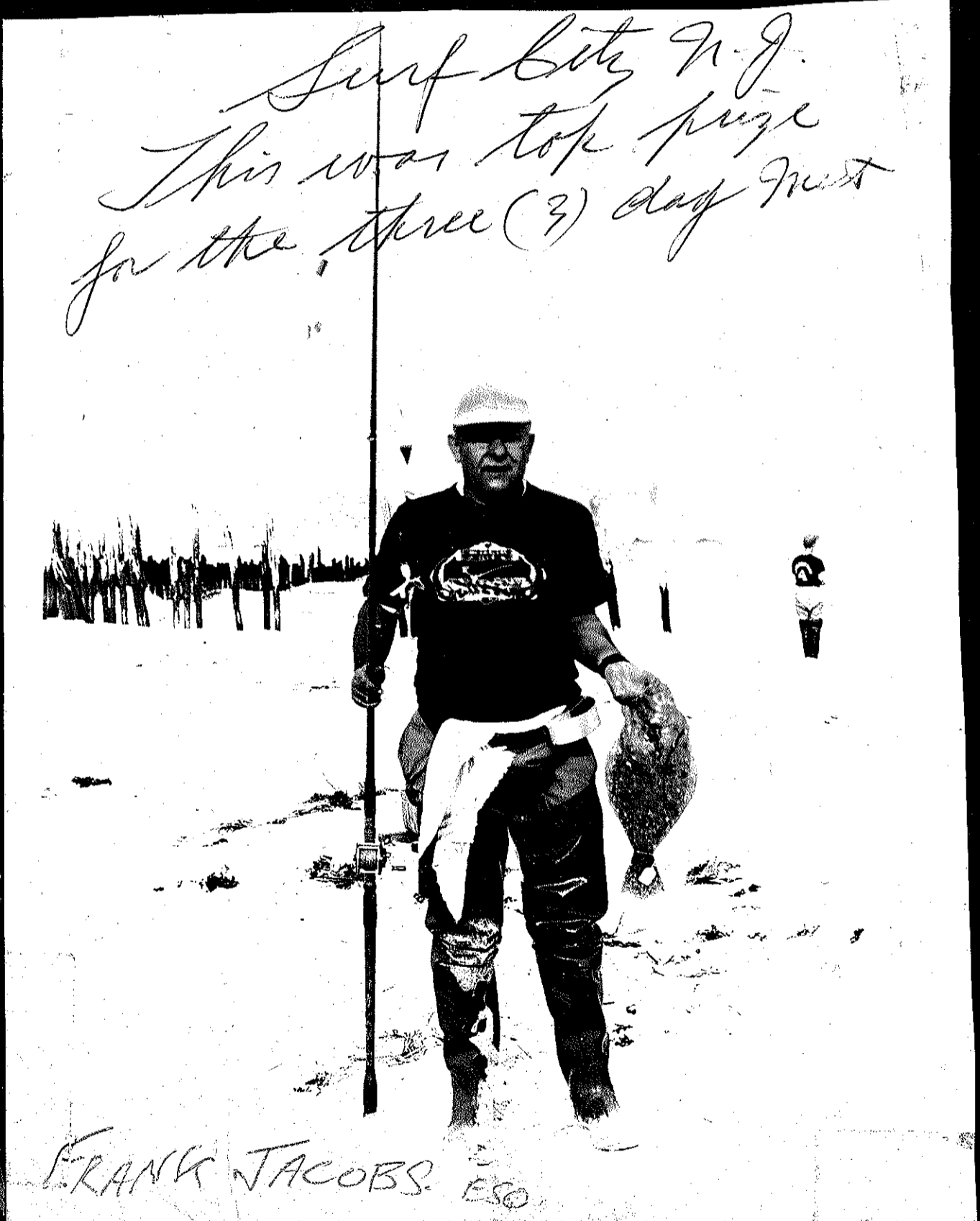
King and flounder fishing has been stepped up in the back bay. Those fishing from rowboats have been bringing in large catches. Ground bunker for chum tops the list.

### Margate Man Built Fireworks Co. Plant

Joseph H. Roberts, 63, of 111 N Osborne av. Margate, died yesterday in Atlantic City Hospital after an illness of two months. He had been a Margate resident for 17 years. He was born in Providence, R.I. Before moving to Margate he lived in New York City. Former munitions consultant for the Western Cartridge Co. of Alton, Ill., and the National Fireworks Co. of E. Hanover, Mass., he was responsible for the erection of the latter's plant at Mays Landing. He was a member of the Army Ordnance Association of Washington, D.C., as well as munitions consultant to the War Department. Prior to the war he had been a consultant of the British Purchasing Commission in this country. Survivors are his wife Aida M., a son Joseph H. Jr. serving in the Merchant Marine, three sisters, Martha Roberts of Attleboro, Mass., Mrs. Linda Jewett of New York City, and Mrs. Deborah Hyde of Wickford Junction, R.I., and two brothers, John and Konland, both of Pawtucket, R.I. He was a member of the Absecon Island Anglers Club fishing having been his lifelong hobby. Funeral services will be held Sunday at 2:30 P.M. from the George H. Winberg Funeral Home, 6426 Ventnor av. Friends may call Saturday evening, 7 to 9. Interment will take place at Laurel Memorial Park. The Rev. Amos A. Crowell will officiate.
